Two From MEE Complete Degrees

Malcolm Eaton Enterprises is pleased to celebrate not one but two very special staff members who have dedicated many hours of study toward advancing their education and professional certifications.

Both Dionne Reid and Ashley Graves began working for the agency as Direct Support Professionals or DSPs. DSPs work closely with individuals with developmental disabilities to help them become more independent and better integrated within their community. Being a DSP is an important position that requires a great deal of patience and compassion for the individuals we serve.

While working as DSPs, both of these dedicated staff members continued taking college courses. As you can imagine, this additional study was at times difficult to balance with full-time jobs. Both staff members, ultimately, completed their bachelor's degrees, as well as additional training, to become Qualified Intellectual Disabilities Professionals, or QIDPs.

Becoming a QIDP is no easy task. In addition to the education requirements, a staff person must have one year of experience working with individuals with developmental disabilities, and then complete an additional forty hours of training, typically over the span of two months.

QIDP's are responsible for coordinating and monitoring each client's progress toward goals. This work involves writing individual service plans, developing and monitoring each person's goals, and planning annual meetings with each client's interdisciplinary team.

We want to congratulate and celebrate both of these staff members for their exceptional dedication and hard work over many months. We are very fortunate to have them be part of our team!

Dionne Reid

Dionne joined the Malcolm Eaton Enterprises team in September of 2014 working as a Developmental Training (DT) Trainer. Since her hire, Dionne was promoted twice. She was first promoted to DT trainer lead in 2016 and was later promoted to Community Job Developer in 2018.

Dionne started working towards continuing her education in 2015, most often working through one course at a time. At times, it was a real challenge to balance her schooling with a full-time job and four children.

After many late nights of study, Dionne persevered and graduated with a BA in Human Services in December of 2018.

Prior to completing her degree, Dionne had worked as a DSP for ten years. According to Dionne, that time helped teach her valuable lessons – most importantly how to have patience and understanding when working with individuals.

Dionne enjoys her new position as a QIDP and is appreciative of Malcolm Eaton for allowing her to have flexibility in her schedule.

Ashley Graves

Ashley joined the Malcolm Eaton Enterprises team in April of 2017 as a support worker in our 24-hour residential program. Just three months after being hired, Ashley was promoted to the position of Home Coordinator. Ashley spent 2017 and 2018 working in both our residential and day training programs.

Ashley completed her BA in Psychology from Columbia College in March of 2019, and shortly thereafter began working as a DT Instructor / QIDP.

For Ashley, working full time and completing college coursework left little time for anything but work, study and sleep. At one point, Ashley recalls taking 18 credit hours per semester. To get through that semester, she studied any place, and any time, she could.

But the sacrifice was worth it. Ashley finds working as a QIDP to be a very rewarding experience.

"I really like being able to watch the individuals grow and work towards their goals," Ashley said.

Learning and Having Fun

Four times a year, MEE conducts all-day staff training sessions called "Institute Days." Institute Days are a great chance to learn new skills, but they are also a chance to have fun.
