

Our Mission

Malcolm Eaton Enterprises encourages and assists people with disabilities, and those who touch their lives, by promoting informed choice and creating opportunities which foster independent community living, work and play.

IDOT Program Awards MEE Two Paratransit Vehicles

Malcolm Eaton Enterprises added two new buses to its growing fleet of paratransit vehicles this Spring.

The vehicles are funded through a Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Program called Section 5310. This program helps provide transportation to individuals with disabilities and the elderly.

The Illinois Department of Transportation administers this program through a process called the Consolidated Vehicle Procurement, or CVP.

Nonprofits like MEE apply for vehicles through the CVP, and IDOT purchases and awards them to organizations using funds provided by the FTA.

This year, MEE added two 14passenger "Medium Duty" vehicles. Each of the vehicles can seat between five and 14 passengers depending how the vehicle is configured.

As part of the agreement, MEE provides IDOT with ridership data, including the number of trips we provide each year as well as vehicle mileage. The information is used to help IDOT award vehicles to the groups and areas most in need.

In 2024, MEE provided over 60,000 trips to clients with disabilities in Freeport and surrounding communities.

This program is important to our organization as the cost of paratransit vehicles is very expensive. Each of the vehicles awarded has a unit cost of \$120,000.

MEE currently has twelve vehicles in its fleet that are funded with Section 5310 funds.




Safety First

The vehicles that MEE received from the Section 5310 CVP program can be configured to seat anywhere between 5-14 passengers. Each vehicle has been fitted with safety and climate control features ensuring that all riders can travel safely and comfortably, no matter where they go.

MEE Opens 6th CILA Home

After months of renovations, MEE will open its sixth CILA home this Spring. The home will provide 24-hour care for five clients in Freeport.

The house has been outfitted with new furniture, appliances and electronics throughout.

The home was funded largely through the Craig Wilson Memorial Trust. The Wilson trust has helped MEE purchase and renovate five homes since 2017. Today, MEE operates six homes and serves 27 clients every day.

In addition, this home received a new roof thanks to a donation by GreenState Credit Union.

Thanks to some additional donations, renovations will continue this summer as the home adds fencing and an outdoor recreational area.
